# Literally going that extra mile

It always pleases me to read about how active and caring both residents and staff are. A quick glance through any newsletters demonstrates this perfectly. The lengths you all go to when helping others is particularly humbling. This happens across Hanover's developments, and there's a couple of examples I'd like to specifically highlight.

Recently, a number of staff came together to take part in the Edinburgh Marathon Festival weekend event, taking part in both the full marathon and a 5k event. Tracy Watt – one of our Telecare Operators who many of you have spoken to either in person or when you've activated your alarm – arranged the event to raise money for a charity that's very close to her heart: SANDS Lothian (Stillbirth And Neo-natal Death Society). Our wonderful team pulled out all the stops. Many were running for the first time and it was a really tough task – but they all did it. They raised a fantastic  $\pounds 1,466$ , and in total SANDS raised a massive  $\pounds 21,000$ .

Even more impressive is the number of staff and residents that have taken part in the Step Count Challenge. The annual event, where staff and residents are given pedometers to measure the number of steps they take – is always a great excuse to get out and about and indulge in some friendly competition, as well as getting to know your neighbours better. I'm delighted to announce the winners of this year's event -Hanover's staff team called The Foxy Forresians' Cameron Court Cuties. They managed to notch up nearly four and a half million steps. I also wanted to highlight the efforts of Ian Ford, our resident from Tollgate House in Armadale. On his own he managed to walk more than 1.3 million steps -

the equivalent of walking from Armadale to Copenhagen! Terrific – well done to all of you.

These are just two examples of generosity and camaraderie that's common to so many aspects of life in a Hanover development. It perfectly demonstrates our values of caring and wellbeing of both our staff and residents. In fact, going that extra mile in the true sense of the word – something I see time and time again.

I want to take this opportunity to thank you all for what you do – whether it's running a marathon, stepping out with your friends on a healthy walk, or simply arranging a coffee morning and being there when your neighbours need you. # How to make your own poppies

With Remembrance Sunday just a couple of months away, we're aware many residents like to create and sell their own poppies to raise money for the poppy appeal. Thanks to a couple of kind residents, we can reproduce the knitting and crochet patterns below. Pictured is resident **Wilma Morrison** of **Westknowe Gardens** in **Glasgow** modelling the knitted version. You can get a great range of poppy merchandise from **www.poppyscotlandstore.com**.

#### **Crochet**:

For the poppy:

- Chain 4 stiches
- Slip stitch to make a circle
- Chain 3 stitches (counts as first treble)
- Either make 11 more trebles into centre of circle, or for a larger petal 16 more trebles
- Make three petals and join together by overlapping
- Use a black button to sew in the centre.

#### For the leaf:

Either cut a felt leaf and stitch it on, or crochet a leaf doing the following:

- Chain 10 stitches
- Slip stitch into 2nd chain stitch from end.
- Chain into next
- Half treble into next 5 chain stitches
- Chain into next
- Slip into last stitch.

#### Finishing off:

Sew a safety pin into the back, making the poppy into a brooch, or fix any remaining strands of wool to a piece of thin garden wire (about 4-6 inches) and then bind the wire with green wool to make it into the stem of a flower.

#### **Knitting**:

Note: Slip all slipped sts purlwise with yarn at wrong side of work. Using double cast on method and red yarn, cast on 41 stitches using 4mm needles. Leave a yarn tail of at least 10 inches long.

Row 1: \*S1, k7, repeat from \* to last stitch, p1.

Row 2: \*S1, knit to end.

Row 3: As row 1.

Row 4: S1, p7, \*s1, take yarn to back of work between 2 needles then around knitting over cast on edge, over top of knitting between 2 needles and around cast on edge again, so ending at front of work, pull yarn to gather knitting tightly, p7, rep from \* to last stitch, k1.

Cut off yarn and change to black yarn.

Row 5: \*k2 Tog, repeat from \* to last 3 stitches, sk2p. (20 stitches).

Row 6: knit.

Row 7: (K2 tog.) x 10 (10 stitches).

Slip all stitches back onto left hand needle. Then cut off yarn, leaving a tail of at least 10 inches. Thread yarn tail through a large eyed needle. With right side facing, thread yarn through remaining stitches. Slip them off the needle as you proceed. Pull yarn tightly to gather stitches firmly. With wrong side facing and still using large eyed needle, oversew row ends of flower together, working from centre to beginning of petal yarn. Add a safety pin to the back of your poppy and your brooch is finished.

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# Bigger than just a coffee morning

We're very excited about the forthcoming Big Coffee Mornings, where so many of you get together to raise money for the wonderful charity that is MacMillan. But one development has gone that extra mile, and raised a fortune throughout the year for this worthwhile organisation and others.

Residents at **Kings Park Mews** in **Glasgow** not only run a Big Coffee Morning, but have also formed a highly successful knitting bee that has raised literally thousands of pounds over the last few years. We visited the development and met with **Morag Murray** and her fellow knitters to find out how they went about it.

"The Bee has been running for nine years", Morag told us. "My washing day is a Tuesday. I'd find myself with a bit of time on my hands after putting the washing on, so would stay in the lounge and do a bit of knitting. My neightbour Marie Strong and I started it and it just grew from there."

There's now a regular 11 people in the knitting group, and no knitting job is too small. Over the last year they've estimated that they've



donated more than 500 hats to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Glasgow, 400 blankets to nursing homes and they also take on much bigger projects that they then raffle off at their annual big coffee morning.

Even non-knitters are getting involved in the fund raising. "One resident puts all his small change in a jar and last year gave us  $\pounds 50$ " explained Morag. "Last year we raised more than  $\pounds 2,000$  for MacMillan, and also donated  $\pounds 500$ to the Prince and Princess of Wales Cancer Hospice. They estimate they've raised more than  $\pounds 10,000$  for MacMillan.

"Residents say after they've seen me their arms are sore! I'm not sure if that's through the arm-twisting or the knitting!" Morag jokes.
