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


Sunflower Competition

Remembrance 2018

In November 2018, we marked the centenary of the end of World War 1. On Remembrance Sunday, people around the Commonwealth reflected on lives that have been lost and irrevocably changed by conflict. Some 65 million men were mobilised across Europe during World War 1. Nearly a third of them – some 21 million – were wounded. Another 8.5 million were killed and some 7.7 million were made prisoners of war. Numerous conflicts since then have left families and friends in mourning and service personnel living with life changing injuries. As time moves on and some of these wars pass out of living memory, it is important to record some of those memories for future generations, not just to commemorate but also to remember the cost and importance of peace.

Two Hanover residents have been kind enough to share stories with us. We also wanted to show some of the activities that Hanover residents have undertaken to mark Remembrance and the centenary of the armistice.

Ms Mary Connolly, resident of Hanover Court in Dunblane sent us some of the experiences that her father, Mr Charles A. Connolly had recorded in writing during the First World War. I am only sorry that we don't have room to print more of what she sent, the stories range from horrific to laugh out loud funny. As Mr Connolly himself wrote; "One aspect of human nature tends to be forgotten in these times and that is a sense of humour is essential for survival."

One of the stories Mr Connolly recalls was a chance encounter with the enemy.

"I crouched down in the dugout as the advancing sounds of 'Gerry' grew louder until, next minute I was literally bowled over by a sudden weight falling on top of me. I thought I was sent for. I lay there stunned till the survival instinct kicked in and I raised my head to see what had hit me and found myself looking into the eyes of a German soldier. He couldn't have been any more than sixteen, just a wee boy crying for his mammy. In between sobs he was pointing to his leg, which I could see was covered in blood with a big piece of shrapnel sticking out. I patted him on the shoulder and told him he'd be alright, hoping he'd at least understand my desire to help him. There is no language barrier in such a situation. I brought out the first aid kit we all carried. The shrapnel hadn't gone in too deep and it was a matter of cleaning the wound as best I could and then applying a bandage. As I worked away, my German comrade began to speak through the tears, pulling out photos of his mother and father, pointing at each one to help me understand, Here I was, Charlie Connolly, nineteen years old from the Garngad in Glasgow, lying in a mucky trench in France sharing the space with a wee German laddie, while we looked at his photos, tears streaming down our faces.

When I'd finished dressing the wound, I waited till there as a lull in the firing before sending him off with a prayer, a couple of fags and some chocolate. I buried my head in my hands as in the moment I realised that could have been me hoping for a good Samaritan. I cried."





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Mr Joseph McGovern has been a resident of **Cleddens Court** in **Bishopbriggs** for 12 years. He is a World War 2 veteran who joined the army in 1939. At first, he was sent to North Africa to join up with the Royal Artillery for two years. He was then sent to Baghdad and then on to Italy for a further two years. During his tour of Sicily, he was on his way back to the barracks one night when he heard some soldiers singing behind him. To his disbelief, there were his two brother Pat and Danny who he had not seen since he left Glasgow for the war. All three brothers were united and came home safely to their family when the war was over.





As part of the **Kincardine** village church commemoration celebrating 100 years since the First World War, a cascade of knitted poppies has been put on show.

Two of the residents at **Sivewright Court**, **Mrs Marion Coote** and **Mrs Catherine Cuke** have knitted 200 poppies as part of their contribution to more than 2,000 poppies that make up the stunning display.

Broxburn resident **Liz McKay** penned this moving poem in honour of Remembrance Day. Liz does a huge amount of work to support Poppy Scotland and can be seen on the Poppy Scotland website talking about the importance of Remembrance.


At the going down of the sun

Hanover is proud to announce that following consultations with Investors in People (IIP), we have now been upgraded from the Bronze to Silver Award.

The accreditation followed more than three years of interviews with staff members who work across the business. To award the accreditation, IIP had to review a wide range of criteria including people procedures, systems and ways of working at Hanover. The next process involved interviews with staff from each team to check levels of engagement, development, benefits and wellbeing.



Age Scotland have introduced a new, paid service called **Good Day Calls**. This involves a daily call 365 days a year, to have a chat and check on the welfare of an older person. The service costs $\pounds 50$ per month. To find out more, call **01856 898 222**.

Hanover has recently begun work on the **re-tendering of the reactive maintenance contracts** in the Glasgow, Edinburgh and Ayrshire areas.

These are the contracts that we have with firms who come out and undertake emergency maintenance and repairs on developments.

We are required to do this under the Government's procurement rules, which aim to ensure that public money is spent as efficiently and transparently as possible.

We will have more information on this process and the likely outcomes in the March edition of the Grapevine.

Scottish Minister for Older People and Equalities visits Linkwood View



Christina McKelvie MSP officially opened Hanover's **Linkwood View** development in **Elgin** on 21 October.

Linkwood View welcomed its first residents in September 2017 and is specially designed with innovative high-quality services including dementia care, wheelchair adaptations and Extra Care facilities. The site has won multiple awards including Social Housing Development of the Year by Premier Guarantee and a commendation from the Saltire Society who said it provided "a template to provide future care to a growing elderly demographic with dementia."

Ms McKelvie was given a detailed tour of the site, and met with staff and residents. She also met with children from the local nursery which borders the development. To encourage intergenerational interactions, Hanover has gifted a small part of the large garden area of Linkwood View for the nursery to maintain to allow them to grow their own plants and flowers. Not only has this assisted with outdoor educational activity for the children, it has engendered an intergenerational understanding between the residents and the nursery children.

Ms McKelvie: "It's great to see a second development by Hanover Scotland linking housing and care for older people in one setting.

"This is a really good example of the kind of innovative thinking we want to see around the care for older people as and when they might need it. It allows older people to retain their independence for longer, which is so important, and can also tackle other issues such as social isolation."



New Developments



In August, local MSP Richard Lochhead visited Hanover's new 44 home site at **Spynie** near **Elgin**, which is being developed in partnership with Health & Social Care Moray.

The new development, which will be known as **Hamilton Gardens**, is expected to open in autumn 2019. It will consist of 44 two-bedroom homes, ranging from amenity flats and cottages to extra care flats with five specially designed to accommodate wheelchair users. It will also have a common room for residents to socialise in, a kitchen and two offices.

Mr Lochhead said: "It was great to meet Hanover Scotland and Robertson who are working to deliver this key development at Spynie and to hear how people's individual needs will be met here. The benefits of providing good quality care in the community that allows older people to retain their independence are well known, and this kind of modern, purpose built housing is much needed in Moray. Many families are going to be well served by this new development and I'm looking forward to seeing these new homes once they're completed and to hopefully meeting the residents who will benefit from this investment."

A new Hanover social housing development at **Stonecross Hill** in **Elgin** was welcomed by the Graham Leadbitter of Moray Council as he visited the construction site at the beginning of October.

The new development of affordable housing, which will be known as Stonecross once completed, is expected to open in March 2019. It will consist of 16 general needs homes, ranging from one-bedroom cottage style flats to three and four-bedroom semi-detached houses.

Councillor Leadbitter said: "Hanover Scotland have a reputation for high quality supported accommodation and I was pleased to meet with them and be shown around the development. It is clearly being built to a high standard and Hanover Scotland are clearly committed to seeing the development integrate well with the surrounding area and to build strong neighbourhood relationships."
