Coronavirus update

Scotland has now entered Phase 3 of the route map for coming out of lockdown. On 1 August, the Scottish Government announced that shielding measures would be 'paused'. The new rules mean that restrictions have been relaxed for anyone who was advised to shield from others, due to underlying health reasons, when the pandemic first started in March.

Nevertheless, the Government advice for everyone is to remain cautious and to follow FACTS

- Face coverings in enclosed spaces and on public transport
- Avoid crowded places
- Clean your hands and surfaces regularly
- Two-metre social distancing
- Self-isolate and book a test if you develop coronavirus symptoms

While several of the key indicators in Scotland, including confirmed COVID-related hospital admissions, have remained very low, Covid is still here and we have seen a rise in cases during August. This has been driven largely but not only by the outbreak in and around Aberdeen. The next Scottish Government review date for advice is 10 September.

We know that many of you are keen to see the communal lounges re-open but for the moment, we are taking a cautious approach. We are acting in agreement with our fellow housing associations such as Bield and Trust and keeping them closed. In the meantime, Hanover continues to monitor the situation closely.

The development secured financing from the Co-op Community Fund to renovate the garden and while the project was delayed by Covid-19, it has now been completed.


Residents now have a spacious patio area for wheelchairs and walkers, which is even more beneficial with the current need for social distancing.

My Hanover - your residents' portal

Did you know that you can check the balance of your account with Hanover at any time of the day or night? Our residents' portal allows you to check the balance of your rent or service charge, report repairs and update your details at a time that suits you.

It is very easy to access the portal. All you need to do is go to the My Hanover section of our website at **www.hanover.scot/welcome-to-my-hanover/** and click Register.



You should then see a page that looks like this. You will need to fill in your surname and date of birth followed by your account number (your X number) and click next. The site will then ask for an email address. Shortly afterwards you will receive an email from us.

To complete your registration, you just need to click on the link in the email. This will take you back to the website and you will be able to access your details. You can also make payments via the portal, rather than waiting to speak to one of us on the telephone.
